PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE, SRI LANKA CANCER SOCIETY

Cancer continues to be the second most common hospital mortality in Sri Lanka. Breast, Prostate and Lung Cancers are leading with highest numbers of cases. However, mortality rate is high in Lung related, Pancreatic, Colon and Rectal Cancers. Some Cancers such as Breast, Cervix and Colon can be prevented or detected early by surveillance programs. Some others can be prevented by lifestyle changes such as smoking cessation. We strongly believe continuous education and increase in tariffs will effect these lifestyle changes among our younger generation.

Early and accurate diagnosis of Cancer is of paramount importance with the availability of newer more effective therapies. Whether curative options are available or not, we must also not forget the quality of life of people with Cancer. Excellent treatment options should be available for symptom management and palliative care need to be a cornerstone of Cancer management.

The Country was just recovering from the effects of the COVID pandemic having faced regular shut downs of normal activities which severely disrupted the programmes of SLCS. There was also a requirement to comply with the health and safety procedures introduced by the Government and we have ensured going beyond.

During the year, Sri Lanka faced political and unprecedented economic crisis due to the depleting foreign reserves. The food security of the people has also been threatened. We are now on the road to partial recovery to tide over the immediate issues faced by the country.

We are fully conscious of the hardships faced by the people of Sri Lanka which has severely impacted on the activities of SLCS. The activities during the period under review were carried out in the backdrop of such macro-economic conditions. Prevailing economic situation affected fund raising activities of the Society during the year under review.

Society continued to focus on the devastating effects of scourge of Cancer regardless of cultural, social or ideological background. I am proud to mention tireless efforts of our volunteers made us maintain our activities without any setback whilst maintaining our facilities at the best standards.

We take this opportunity to thank Mr. Sohli Captain for his continued support to the Society. We are also grateful to those who helped us with outstanding generosity. Without the support of our donors we wouldn't have been able to continue our commitment to provide Cancer patients with the quality of life they deserve during this difficult period.

I thank Chairperson and the members of Executive Committee, the members of Sub Committees and our staff for their commitment to maintain services of the Society without interruption. Also my thanks go out to our volunteers who have given so much of their time and effort in selfless service to promote the activities of the Society.

I wind up saying Sri Lanka Cancer Society will continue its efforts to prevent Cancer, early detection, help cure Cancer and provide relief of pain to those affected by this deadly decease.

Let's leave a better Sri Lanka with reduced incidence of Cancer for our children.

The Minutes of the 73rd Annual General Meeting held on March 04, 2021 were confirmed. Proposed by Mrs. Shantha Abeysekera and seconded by Mrs. Dilini Gunesekera.

The President, Ms. Anoja Karunaratne in her address of welcome extended a warm welcome to the Chairman and members of the Sub-Committees, representatives of the Branch Societies, Chairman and members of the Executive Committee, and all distinguished Ladies and Gentlemen present.

She said that The Sri Lanka Cancer Society was completing 74 years of service to the community and can be proud of its achievements in the care of Cancer patients.

She said the world has changed dramatically during the last two years. All of us are continuously learning to cope with the Pandemic and its effect on our lives. The Pandemic has deprioritized all our plans and placed many challenges in carrying out all our critical activities. It is in times of challenge that we learn what our true resilience is.

She mentioned that according to the recently published statistics by WHO, Cancer is a leading cause of death worldwide accounting for nearly 10 million deaths in 2020 and around 20 million

new Cancer cases each year. Breast Cancer and Lung Cancer are reported to be the most common cases of Cancer. In Sri Lanka the new cases reported in 2020 were around 30,000. With the number of deaths recorded as 16,691 Breast Cancer in females and Oral Cancer in males take the lead.

In recent years the UN, WHO and UN related organizations have recognized the urgent need for a global commitment to reduce the Cancer incidence. By implementing appropriate strategies for early detection and treatment we can save lives.

Moving on she said today statistics show more than 65% of Cancer deaths are happening in the least developed parts of the world. Iniquities still exist in developed countries too, among the lower income groups. Equitable access to Cancer prevention, early diagnosis and treatment can save lives. Realizing this problem the theme selected by the United International Cancer Control (UICC) in Geneva for World Cancer Day was "Close the Care Gap" which is all about iniquities in Cancer Care around the globe.

People who seek Cancer treatment hit barriers at every turn. This can be due to low income, lack of education, age, disability etc. This is common to Sri Lanka too. It is therefore up to all stake holders to remove these barriers and collectively work towards building of a fairer vision for the future where people can live healthier and better lives. The objective is to recognize gaps in the system and propose improvements to ensure the population have access to proper care and reduce the incidence of Cancer. Despite the many challenges and difficulties we faced in the past year, we managed to sustain our services uninterrupted. This has been made possible due to the untiring efforts and support extended by all our donors, staff, our branches volunteers, committee members to achieve our purpose. I would like to extend my grateful thanks to them.

The President next called upon the Chairman, Mr. Nihal Rodrigo to deliver his address.,

Addressing the gathering he said "I would like to go into the fundamentals just to understand from the basics whatever role is, may be, we are so much conversant with this subject but it is a main taker, look back and see what, ask ourselves what are we expected to do? Society by definition is a group of people having a common interest a will and a purpose to share the work together in an organized way and just do what needs to be done.

We are a Charitable organization, a Charitable organization would necessarily mean in organising people to voluntarily engage in Charitable activities such as public health. Here we are dealing with a difficult subject, Cancer."

He next went on to give a brief description of the Society's activities. All functions of the Society have been assigned to five sub-Committees under the control and guidance of the Executive Committee in order to carry out their services in a methodical manner. Each Sub-Committee meets once a month and their activities during the month are reported to the Executive Committee for directions and advice.

The Finance Committee under the able guidance of its Chairman has kept the Executive Committee informed of the Society's finances. The income of the Society during the year recorded a sum of Rs. 52,565,003/=. However Society recorded a deficit of Rs.14,240,759/= over its expenditure. He said it was an extremely daunting and challenging year for the Society. He emphasized the need to arrive at programs work designed for the long term sustainability of the Society.

However, despite these difficulties the Society was able to carry out all activities as planned which was made possible due to the efforts of our volunteers, spearheaded by Ms. Perin Captain who worked tirelessly to launch Fund Raising Projects.

The Cancer Home did commendably well despite the Covid 19 challenges. We catered for 657 patients and our staff and dedicated volunteers maintained admirable standards.

The Shantha Sevana Hospice which was established in 1996 did a yeomen service under the able guidance of its Chairman. He said that he would be failing his duty if he did not mention Mr. Sohli Captain for providing funds to set up Shantha Sevana and continuing to provide funds for its maintenance.

The death rate from Cancer is ever increasing in Sri Lanka mainly due to smoking, uncontrolled use of pesticides and weedicides, chewing tobacco with betel, exposure to vehicle and environmental pollution. Public Awareness of these risks were created through the Public Education programmes under the guidance of Chairperson of the Public Education Committee.

As part of the Public Education Committee activity OP-SHOP work was handled by Mrs. Indrani Nanayakkara assisted by Mrs. Nedra Hewavitarne and Mrs. Ira Waniganayake, working as volunteers selling new & nearly new items received as donations. Society earns good income from this project.

He explained that the Relief and Rehabilitation Committee looks after the welfare of the less fortunate Cancer Survivors and those in remission, often helping with much needed drugs, provisions and minor house repairing etc,

He further added that the Branch Societies in Kandy, Galle, and Moratuwa and achieved their aims within their territories liaising with the local Oncology Units

He was extremely grateful to Mr. Sohli Captain - by far the largest single donor of the Society, AIA the Society's first Charity Partner, Health Ministry Officers, Apeksha Hospital Director, Consultants and all Staff, Mr. Nithi Murugesu, the Honorary Legal Advisor, KPMG, Chartered Accountants, Donors, well-wishers, Members of the Executive Committee, Chairmen and members of the Sub-Committees, Staff of the Head Office, Cancer Homes and Hospice Maharagama and all volunteers for their dedicated services.

He paid a special tribute to Ms. Perin Captain who was a tower of strength to the Society.

In concluding his address he said, "I am stepping down as the Chairman of the Executive Committee. I thank you all for your support, co-operation and advice in carrying out my duties. I sincerely hope your co-operation and support will continue unabated to my successor to achieve our ultimate goal to prevent Cancer and help those with Cancer. "

The President then called for the adoption of the Annual Report and the Audited Accounts for the year ended March 2021. These were adopted, Proposed by Ms. Anoja Karunaratne and seconded by Mrs. Dilini Gunasekera.

Thereafter the election of office bearers and Executive Committee for the year 2022/23 took place and following were elected.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRPERSON, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is my privilege to present this report as the Sri Lanka Cancer Society (SLCS) completes another year of service to our community in the fight against Cancer.

The SLCS is extremely proud to be marking its 75th anniversary in 2023 – a significant milestone that few organizations have achieved. Reflecting on our journey so far, we would like to acknowledge and express our gratitude to our founder members and donors for their unwavering commitment, to make the SLCS what it is today. Despite the many challenges, we continued our mission of caring for people suffering from Cancer, raise Public awareness about the disease and how it can be prevented. It is the pre-eminent Non-Governmental Organisation which supports the National Cancer Care Program in the Country.

We are a member of the Union for International Cancer Control (UICC), Geneva and also a member of the Non Communicable Disease (NCD) Alliance in Sri Lanka.

While Global burden of Cancer is increasing, at least one third of Cancers are preventable and many new cases and deaths can be averted through prevention and early detection.

Cancer still remains a real problem in Sri Lanka. According to latest statistics nearly 30,000 cases were detected in 2020. Cancer is one of the leading health concerns in Sri Lanka and needs specialized treatment with dedicated care support system for the patients and their families.

The Covid-19 brought many challenges with it and changed the day to day lives within the community. Without doubt the impact of Covid has been extremely challenging for ourselves, the patients and the staff. As we were just recovering from the effects of the Covid pandemic, the Country also faced a severe economic crisis in 2022 and continues to battle through the worst economic crisis on record.

This affected our fund raising and donor funding. We did not receive the grant from the Health Ministry the last two years.

The Society has five Sub Committees to carry out its activities namely Cancer Homes, Hospice, Relief and Rehabilitation, Public Education and Finance functioning under a Chairman/ Chairperson. The review of the activities for the year are detailed in the Committee reports.

A brief summary is mentioned below:

CANCER HOMES

The Cancer Homes continues to provide accommodation, food, nursing care and medical attention to those patients requiring treatment at the Apeksha Hospital. The Homes can accommodate up to 82 patients at any given time.

The patients are taken in on the recommendation of the Cancer Hospital and all services are provided free of charge. Its close proximity to the Apeksha Hospital is an advantage, as immediate medical attention can be provided to the patients.

A new Committee headed by Dr.(Mrs) Neelamani Paranagama was appointed during 2022 and they have already embarked on much needed building improvements. We have to thank them for their dedication and commitment and also for obtaining donations throughout the year to meet various Capital Expenditure connected with the maintenance of the Homes.

HOSPICE

The Shantha Sevana Hospice care, the first Hospice care facility in Sri Lanka established in 1996, with funds provided by Mr. Sohli Captain, is the leading Palliative care center in the Country and can accommodate up to 32 patients. The patients are provided with nutritious food, medicine recreation and entertainment at the Hospice as well as an important counselling service.

We receive an annual donation by Mr Captain to maintain the Hospice. We extend our deep sense of gratitude to him.

We appreciate the work carried out by the Chairman Dr Panna Gooneratne and the Committee members for overseeing the operations and maintenance of the Hospice.

In recognition of our contribution to Palliative care, the SLCS received a Palliative care Excellence award by the College of Palliative Care medicine in Sri Lanka at its inauguration in October 2021.

FINANCE

The year under review has recorded a deficit of Rs.4.8m in our income and expenditure account. The deficit continues to be persistent particularly with the present economic crisis facing the Country, escalation of costs, and absence of fund raising opportunities.

We appreciate the efforts made by all sub Committees in managing the expenditure while maintaining the same standard of service delivery despite the financial constraints. We are aware of the increase in demand for Hospice and Nursing care for Cancer patients in the Country and the greatest challenge we face is the lack of funds.

Investments are a significant source of funding for the Society. It is the responsibility of the Finance Sub - Committee to assess/review our investment portfolio to ensure our funds are well managed and invested wisely to bring in the best returns.

They also ensure that all Major Capital Expenditure are carefully evaluated and controlled and high standards of financial discipline and governance are maintained.

We thank the Chairman Mr Anura Perera and the Committee members for managing the Society's funds prudently.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

The Public Education is a vital aspect of Cancer prevention. The function of the public Education Committee is to raise public awareness about Cancer and to encourage its prevention, detection and treatment. The seminars /programs are planned and structured by our Public Education Officer, Mr Merril Perera and carefully evaluated by the Committee, and implemented to ensure the message is conveyed to the community groups who are most vulnerable.

During the year Programs were carried out to various community groups including Garment Factories, Schools, Police officers, Local Authorities, Urban Council, Colombo Municipality, Prisons department, University students, Sri Lanka Telecom both physically and on line as detailed in the Committee report.

The contribution made by Mr Merril Perera in this regard has been highly commended and well received by all groups. We also continue our programs on line, as well as on TV and You Tube (Veritas).

With the Covid pandemic we were unable to continue our poly clinic since 2020. However we are planning to commence the clinic during the year.

We are indeed grateful to Chairperson and the Sub-Committee members who have carried out this important aspect of the Society.

Our special thanks to Mrs Indrani Nanayakkara and Mrs Ira Waniganayake for working as volunteers in the Op shop to raise funds.

RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

The main function of the Relief and Rehabilitation is to look after the less affluent Cancer Survivors. The Committee overlooks the welfare of 125 Survivors registered under the Relief and Rehabilitation program. We provide them with a monthly grant as well as dry rations, drugs and Home visits.

They are sponsored by various donors and we are very grateful to them as they continue to support the Society to meet these expenses.

We extend our appreciation to the Chairperson Mrs. Hyacinth de Rosayro and the Committee members for their commitment.

Special thanks also to Ms. Dulsiri Jayasinghe for her contribution to the family of Cancer survivor Master Osanda Sathruwan to complete the construction of their house.

OUR BRANCHES

We have decentralized the work of the Society though our Branch network in accordance with the Act No 10 of 1997.

The Audited Accounts and the Branch Reports are reproduced separately in this publication.

Kandy Branch is one of our most active Branches. They maintain a Cancer Home, provide valuable counselling services, conduct awareness programs, supply much needed drugs to the Cancer patients in the Kandy Hospital. They also continue with the Foster Parent Scheme as detailed in their report. They have also introduced home visits to check on the patients who have completed their course of treatment.

We appreciate the work done by the Branch in pursuing the objectives of the Society.

The Moratuwa Branch under the –adopt- a -patient scheme continue to pay a monthly grant and currently they support over 50 patients. Home visits are carried out by the Committee members to assess the needs of the patients. In addition to the monthly grant they also provide the patients with dry packs, drugs, gift vouchers etc. to ease their financial burden.

We thank the Chairman and Committee members for their commitment and dedication.

Galle Branch - They provide numerous services which include fund raising campaigns, supply of meals to Cancer patients, public awareness programs for the benefit of various community groups, and supply of essential drugs. They work very closely with the Karapitiya Cancer Hospital.

We appreciate the work done by this Committee.

It should be noted however that the Audited Accounts and Branch Reports of Anuradhapura and Batticaloa have not been submitted.

APPRECIATIONS

In conclusion as we look ahead I would like to lay emphasis on a few important aspects emerging in the horizon :

The year under review has reported a deficit of Rs. 4.8m. However, the 9 months ended December 2022 has so far recorded a deficit in the region of Rs.14m. But with the income from investments, additional donor contributions in the first quarter, the gap is expected to reduce.

We at the Cancer Society are doing our best to ensure that we maintain our services uninterrupted despite the challenges we face from time to time. We also need to expand as we are aware of the increase in demand for Hospice and Nursing care for Cancer patients. The greatest drawback is the inadequacy of funds. With ever rising costs within the prevailing adverse economic environment our monthly expenses exceeding donations will no doubt challenge our expansion plans.

Despite these challenges as we mark our 75th year, I reach out to all our donors, well-wishers and volunteers to join us in our effort to provide the Cancer patients the quality of life they deserve.

Sri Lanka Cancer Society (SLCS) reported a net deficit of Rs. 4.8 m compared to a deficit of Rs. 14.2 m last year. Although interest income decreased by 19% against last year due to lower interest rates, general donations increased by 33% and restricted fund donations also increased by 32%. Included under the general donations were a substantial donation by Ms. Y, Vijeyabalasingham amounting to Rs. 6 mn a donation of Rs. 4mn from Mr. R D Bandaranayake and donation from our Insurance partner AIA amounting to Rs.4mn . While Mr. S. Captain donated to Rs. 25m towards the Hospice Fund. I wish to thank these donors for their continued support and generosity.

Despite the adverse conditions that prevailed, Society was able to raise Rs.2.1mn from 'Kill a Cancer Cell' project which was spearheaded by Ms. Captain.

We were able to maintain the expenditure of the Society almost at the same levels, which helped to narrow the deficit compared to last year.

The outlook for the year 22/23 is going to be extremely challenging with the dire economic circumstances that the country is going through and escalation of energy costs as well as almost all other goods and services. Expenditure rationalization is our continuous focus without compromising on the quality of care to patients.

We have received the Audited Financial statements from Kandy, Moratuwa and Galle Branches. As Anuradhapura Branch has been delinquent in submitting audited financial statements despite continuous reminders, a decision will be taken this year with regard to the this Branch.

Once again I wish to thank Mr. Sohli Captain and other donors for their continued support. I wish to thank the my fellow members in the Committee and the Executive Committee for their help and support.

The Bandaranaike Memorial Cancer Homes situated in close proximity to the Apeksha Hospital provides accommodation to cancer patients seeking treatment at the hospital. It can accommodate up to 82 patients and all patients who are admitted must necessarily be referred to the Homes by the Consultant at the hospital. Accommodation, food, nursing care and immediate medical attention are provided free to all patients.

New Homes Committee was appointed in 2022.

The New Homes Committee has been very active since they took office in 2022, making many changes which have brought positive results to the operations and maintenance of the Cancer Homes.

Repairs and Maintenance.

Much needed repairs including repairs to the manholes, roof, drains and other smaller items such as electrical, plumbing have been done through the generosity of our Donors. Garden was also done up and is now well maintained. The Committee is also planning on improving the appearance of the entrance, admission and lobby area.

Donations

The response for funding and Danes was very effective almost covering the cost of food.

The Tribe fund has collected over 900,000. Other donations around Rs. 5million was also received.

Patient Care

The impact of the visits made by members of the Homes Committee, has made a beneficial effect on the quality of food and the patient care. Patients feel happy and well looked after.

A Christmas party was held, supported by a donor where patients and staff enjoyed with a sing song and gifts.

On the 1st of January a bana and dane were held at the Home.

The Committee too feels that we have been able to achieve good progress and the Home is looking much pleasanter from what it was.

Grateful thanks to the dedication and the hard work of the Committee, things are being streamlined and still more to be done.

A big thank you to the staff for their services rendered.

Established in 1996, the first of its kind in Sri Lanka. The Shantha Sevana Hospice maintained by the Sri Lanka Cancer Society is a "Rest Home" offering free palliative care to terminally ill Cancer patients. The Hospice takes pride in providing utmost care to the patients and completed 26 years of service to the nation.

Major highlights of the activities during the financial year are given below.

ADMISSIONS AND DEATHS

In the period under review there were 89 admissions and 55 deaths. The 62% mortality rate very clearly confirms that the patients coming to the Shantha Sevana are terminally ill and are in the last stages of their lives.

STAFF

Staff comprised of 20 persons, including an Administrative Secretary, a Sister in Charge, qualified Nurses, Hospice Aides, Cooks and a Labourer.

DOCTORS

- 1. Apeksha Hospital palliative care doctor, Dr Suami and Nursing in charge Mrs. Ranasinghe make visits every week or every two week to hospice to check on the patients
- 2. Apeksha Hospital Council Dr Ranjan Withanage visits every two weeks.
- 3. Dr Megha Dissanayake The doctor visits every week.
- 4. Physiotherapy: During the year physiotherapy facilities were re-introduced

To mark Palliative Care month in October 2022, our Nursing staff were awarded a token of appreciation by the Palliative Care section of the Apeksha Hospital in recognition of their yeoman service in Palliative Care.

Reaching out to needy Cancer survivors is the objective of the Relief and Rehabilitation Committee. This year the numbers of outstation survivors were 100 and outdoor were 25. Money orders are posted to all 125 survivors. Sponsorship scheme continues and we are grateful to the Sponsors for their caring generosity year in & year out.

Hampers were distributed during the Sinhala/Tamil New Year and at Christmas only for outdoor survivors and special gift of Rs.3,000/= to 100 Nos. outstation Survivors. Rs.5,000/- worth of Vouchers were distributed among 25 outdoor patients from time to time during the last year.

We operate a Drug Fund - with the help of generous donors, to provide needy Medicines to very poor Cancer patients, according to the Society's rules.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

COMMITTEE ON WELFARE OF PATIENTS

At present there are 50 registered patients. Due to prevailing high cost of living and the financial difficulties faced by the most of the patients, the Committee Members have done their best to support them with the help of donors, with dry rations packs, medicine, gift vouchers and financially to ease their burden. A donation is made at the death of a patient.

ADOPT-A-PATIENT – SCHEME

The deserving Cancer patients registered under the above scheme are entitled to a monthly payment of Rs.1,500/= each totaling Rs.900,000/= per annum for 50 Cancer patients. The Swarnamali Trust Fund with the funding of an additional Rs.200/= from the month of February 2022 enabled the monthly payment to be increased from Rs.1,300/= to Rs.1,500/=. An additional payment of Rs.1,000/= was done in April 2022 made possible by the collection made under "Appeal for Funds" by the Committee Members and generous contributors.

Mention has to be made of the special programmes organized by Vice President Ms. Farina Dole for the 50 Cancer patients in the Adopt-a-Patient programme maintained by Moratuwa Branch in September 2022. All Patients and participants were served with who is also a Ventriloquist entertained the patients which helped the patients even for a few minutes to forget the pain and suffering they undergo. A gift was also presented at the end of the programme.

Our grateful appreciation to Ms. Indraneela Fernando for extending her support to the Patients at a time the financial situation is adverse by obtaining cash vouchers to the value of Rs.3,000/= for the 50 patients through a well-wisher.

We appreciate the initiative taken by Ms. Christine Cooray a Committee member of our Society, as the President of the Moratuwa Orient Lions Club in donating Rs.5,000/= each to 5 of our mostly needed Cancer patients, which benefited them immensely during this time of severe financial difficulties.

TILL COMMITTEE

This year the till collections showed an increase in contributions. More tills were placed at strategic locations.

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS GET TOGETHER

A Christmas get-together was held in December 2021 for the patients, at the Lions Activity Centre, Koralawella, Moratuwa. Each patient received a cash gift of Rs.4,000/= made possible by the collection made by the committee Committee members. We are grateful to the Tyrone Fernando Foundation for their generous contribution of a valuable dry rations pack at this time of need.

It is with much pleasure I present my report for the year under review. Despite many difficulties faced due to the financial crisis from the beginning of the year with scarcities all around, the Society under the stewardship of Mrs. Thaylam Varagunam assisted by the Ladies Committee, Volunteers and a much dedicated staff of the Cancer Home maintained the required standards at all times with the wellbeing of patients as the foremost objective in mind of the Society. With a bed strength of 95, the Cancer Home recorded an increase in patients over the corresponding year.

LADIES COMMITTEE

The Ladies Committee under the guidance of Ms. Mirani Liyanage does yeoman service in assisting the Society in maintaining the tidiness and hygienic conditions of the Cancer Home. This year too it organized many activities for the patients, commencing with the Thai Pongal

celebrations in January co-ordinated by Ms. Sumathi Gunasekeran and Mrs. Thaylam Varagunam with the assistance of the Tamil Traders Association.

The New Year celebrations weren't held with the fuel crisis at its peak in April. However, the Bakthi Gee events of Wesak and Poson and a few musical evenings for patients were held. The annual Christmas party was held as in the previous years.

Pi's with deep regret we record the sudden demise of two active members – the late Mrs. Sharmini Wickremasinghe and Mrs. Nirmani Wijegunawardena who assisted in numerous ways in all activities of the Cancer Society in general.

AWARENESS/EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

The assistance of three members of the Executive Committee, namely Doctors Gamini Dissanayake, Susil Siriwardene and Yoga Anthony are available to conduct awareness programmes. These are mainly undertaken in the outstations, whilst education programmes for volunteers are also conducted with resource personnel. This year we were able to undertake only two continuing education programmes, due to the constraints faced by all concerned.

HOME VISITS

Visiting patients who have completed their course of treatment is a novel concept introduced by Mr. Mohan Samarakoon. During these visits, a doctor and a nurse who accompanies us check if the patient visited regular clinics etc., Two Home Visit programmes were undertaken in Polonnaruwa and its suburbs.

FOSTER PARENTS SCHEME

Under this programme, the requirements of the families who have children afflicted with Cancer are checked on. Provisions, Clothing and financial assistance are offered to the needy. Mrs. Kusum Rajapakse assisted by Ms. Sujani Yakandawala conducts these programmes to our satisfaction.

SCHOOL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

Initiated with only 5 Children in 2017, school going children of Cancer and Kidney patients are assisted by this programme through sponsorship of a minimum of Rs.2,500/= per child and school books bring provided. This is ably handled by Mr. Asoka Palamakumbura, Mrs. Sujani Yakandawala and coordinated by Mr. Mohan Samarakkon. Currently, 128 Children are assisted by this programme.

DRUGS FUND

Donations from well-wishers are most welcome to obtain Cancer Drugs in short supply, both at the National Hospital Kandy and the Cancer Home. This Account is maintained by the Society with every donation being acknowledged. Anyone who wishes to donate, can contact the office for the details.

COUNSELLING OF PATIENTS

A team of volunteer Counselors works in rotation on a weekly basis to counsel patients. This service has been found to be extremely helpful to the patients in maintaining a positive mindset as it is found to be a common feature among them to experience feelings of misery bordering on depression, with many unsettled issues within their families, once they commence treatment as Cancer patients.

The selection of Counselors is through a friendly interview process and we welcome you to join us in this meritorious service.

STAFF MATTERS

Ms. Ruchika Hansamali continues to serve as a capable Administrative Secretary assisted by Mr. C.R. Amerasinghe.

The Matron Ms. D.M. Dassanayake Menike retired in April 2022 after a dedicated service of 11 years. However, She continues to serve the Cancer Home visiting three days per week on a contractual basis. She is an experienced Matron having worked in the Government Sector for 40 years and is of tremendous value to the young members of the Staff. One Nurse and two Attendants were recruited during the year in order to replace vacancies.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Executive Committee, I wish to sincerely thank the Parent Body, all our valued donors, Well Wishers, Volunteers and staff for your continued support in all the activities of the Society and the Cancer Home which continue without disruption despite the many handicaps faced during the year under review.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of 2020/2021 were confirmed and seconded by Mr. A. H. Kamal and Mrs. A. K. Danaseeli respectively.

The Audited and the financial reports presented by the Treasurer W.V. Nandasena were duly adopted.

It was followed by the election of the new office bearers and patrons. A group of Doctors of the Karapitiya Hospital was elected as patrons led by Rev. Kanumuldeniye Chandawimala as the Chief Rev. Patron.

He said that it has progressed well to equal the standard of the Western countries and also mentioned that he started a Hospice during his period but it was not functioning at present. He further stated that the educational programs continued by the Society were initiated by him during his period. Specialized Nursing Matron M. Ranjani delivering her speech said that the Sri Lanka Cancer Society had rendered a valuable service providing facilities to supply essential medicine needed for the patients throughout a period of 45 years.

The tremendous assistance provided by the Patrons, President and the Executive Committee as well as the services rendered by the Doctors and the Nursing staff of the Karapitiya Hospital provided an atmosphere to carry out the duties of the Galle Branch satisfactorily.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Reporting entity

The Sri Lanka Cancer Society – Parent Society ("the Society") is the parent of the Sri Lanka Cancer Society which is incorporated and domiciled in Sri Lanka in terms of the Sri Lanka Cancer Society (Incorporation)) Act No: 10 of 1997.

The activities of "the Society" are carried out with a view to achieving the objects as defined at section 3 of the aforesaid Act and principally focussed on the provision of relief, care and comfort to needy cancer patients and to create awareness amongst the Sri Lankan public on the prevention and treatment of cancer.

Whilst "the Society" encourages the establishment of branches outside Colombo, the management and administration of such branch societies fall within the purview of the Executive Committee of the relevant branch society.

The registered office of "the Society" and the principal place of service is situated at 37/25, Bullers Lane, Colombo 7

1.2 Basis of preparation

(a) Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Society comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2020, statement of income and expenditure, statement of changes in accumulated funds, statement of cash flow and notes to the financial statements. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standard for Small and Medium Sized Entities (SLFRS for SMEs).

Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors in the financial statements.

(b) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the Society's functional currency.

(c) Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards for Small and Medium Sized Entities (SLFRS for SMEs) requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the

circumstances, the result of which form the basis of making the judgment about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised if the revision affects only the financial year or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future financial years.

1.3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

(a) Property, plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset and bringing the assets to its working condition.

Gains/losses on disposal of property, plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and are recognised net within "other operating income" in the statement of comprehensive income and retained earnings.

(ii) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in the statement of income and expenditure on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the asset.

(b) Investments

Long term investments made in share which are publicly traded are fair valued as at the reporting date.

Short term investments in Repo and Fixed deposits are valued at amortized cost.

(c) Other receivables

Other receivables are carried at anticipated realizable value. An estimate is made for bad and doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the year end.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, deposits held at call with bank, and investments in money market instruments with a maturity period less than 3 months.

(e) Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognized in the statement of financial position when there is a present obligation as a result of past events, the settlement of which is expected to result in an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits. Obligations payable at the demand of the creditors or within one year of the reporting date are treated as current liabilities in the statement of financial position. Liabilities payable after one year from the reporting date are treated as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Society has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

(f) Taxation

(i) Income taxation

"The Society" is exempt from income tax on interest income in terms of section 9 read in conjunction with clause (i) of the Third Schedule to the Inland Revenue Act No 24 of 2017 and confirmed by a direction issued by the Inland Revenue Authorities.

(ii) The Society has been recognized as an "Approved charity" in terms of Sec. 52 read in conjunction with clause 1(a) of the Fifth Schedule to the Inland Revenue Act No 24 of 2017.

(iii) Since the Society has been awarded "approved charity" status if falls outside the scope & ambit of an NGO as defined for purposes of the Inland Revenue Act No. 24 of 2017 at sec 195 thereof.

For the year ended 31 March 2022

(g) Employee benefits

(i) Defined benefit plan

Gratuity is a defined benefit plan. The Society is liable to pay gratuity in terms of the relevant statute. In order to meet this liability, a provision is carried forward in the statement of financial position, equivalent to an amount calculated based on project unit credit basis using simplifications specified by the Section 28.

Provision is made for retirement gratuity for all employees in respect of gratuity payable under the Payment of Gratuity Act No.12 of 1983. The provision is not invested in a fund outside the Society. This item is grouped under non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(ii) Defined contribution plan.

Obligations to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the income statement as incurred. The Society contributes 12% and 3% of gross emoluments of employees as Provident Fund and Trust Fund contribution respectively.

(h) Revenue recognition

Regular and adhoc donations and contributions are recognized when it is certain that the donation is made available for the benefit of Society. Interest income are accounted for in the period in which it relates.

(i) Expenses

All expenditure incurred in the operations of the Society and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency have been charged in arriving at the Society's deficit for the year.

(j) Restricted Funds

The society adopted the Statement of Recommended Practice issued by CA Sri Lanka .Where grants are received for use in an identified activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and transferred to the Statement of Comprehensive Income to match with expenses incurred in respect of that identified activity. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included in the Statement of Financial Position until such time as they are required.

Funds collected through a fund raising activity for any specific or defined purpose are also included under this category. The activities for which these restricted funds may and are being used are identified in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment fund

The respective fund is setup as an endowment fund, such funds cannot normally be spent as if it were income to the Society. The income earned from such capital may, however, be utilised for restricted or other purposes of the Society.

For the year ended 31 March 2022

(k) Unrestricted Funds

Unrestricted funds are those that are available for use by Cancer Society at the discretion of the Committee of Management, in furtherance of the general objectives of Cancer Society and which are not designated for any specific purpose.

Surplus funds are transferred from restricted funds to unrestricted funds in terms of the relevant Donor agreements or with the subsequent approval of the Donor.

Contributions received from the general public are recognized in the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a cash basis.

(I) Finance income and expenses

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested. Interest income is recognised as it accrues in statement of income and expenditure.

Finance expenses comprise bank charges and finance expenses are recognised on cash basis.

(m) Events occurring after the reporting date

All material post reporting events have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures have been made in respective notes to the financial statements.

(n) Comparative information

Where necessary, comparative figures have been rearranged to confirm with the current year's presentation.

(o) Commitments and contingencies

Contingencies are possible assets or obligations that arise from a past event and would be confirmed only on the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events, which are beyond the Society's control.

Commitments are disclosed in Note 15 to the financial statements. Contingent liabilities are disclosed in Note 16 to the financial statements.
